







Freedom City 2017 Steering Group Expectations of Members

Background

The day Martin Luther King was made an Honorary Doctor of Civil Law remains one of the most important moments in Newcastle University's history and was the result of the aspirations and vision of University staff at the time. Our historians, geographers and political scientists have a long history of researching, teaching and crucially, championing civil rights and it is with this in mind, that we continue to build on the King legacy at Newcastle.

The Freedom City 2017 Steering Group is responsible for informing and influencing a programme of activity across the city to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Martin Luther King receiving the Honorary Degree. This programme will reflect on the three great issues posed by Dr King in his acceptance speech at Newcastle - poverty, militarism, and racism - and members of the Steering Group are tasked with helping to ensure that events and projects are delivered in a way that reflects the interests and priorities of NewcastleGateshead.

The Steering Group includes senior representatives from key regional stakeholders and organisations responsible for local delivery. The Steering Group will meet monthly.

Steering Group members are expected to:

- Set shared legacy objectives between key stakeholders in the region.
- Oversee and steer the development and implementation of a legacy programme, working to agreed priority outcomes and targets including a jointly conceived business plan and media strategy.
- Engage and empower key contributors to help shape and deliver the programme.
- Help secure adequate funding locally and regionally to deliver a range of events and projects.
- Help to make relevant links with appropriate local, regional and national plans, strategies, programmes and influential individuals, positioning NewcastleGateshead a natural lead in social justice and human rights.
- Act as a catalyst in stimulating action and assist in identifying and removing blockages to joined-up local delivery.
- Monitor, evaluate and review progress in accordance with the targets and outcomes.

Steering Group Objectives

Drawing the themes of **war**, **poverty** and **racism** highlighted by Dr King in his acceptance speech, which remain as relevant today as they were in 1967, the aims of the celebrations are:

- To bring Dr King's legacy to life for a new generation of young people that can equip them with knowledge and skills and empower them to contribute towards tackling the great problems of war, poverty and racism.
- To stimulate academic research and debate that can likewise contribute towards finding solutions to the challenges posed by war, poverty and racism.
- To enable artists to create internationally significant work inspired by the themes of Dr King's acceptance speech and galvanise the region's cultural venues and landmark sites as hosts to a global audience.

Steering Group Member Commitments

Steering Group meets monthly for approximately 2 hours. Depending on the discussions and the areas of expertise additional support work outside the meetings may be required.
